Something To Live For In This World

"I am crucifed with Christ; nevertheless I live: yet not I, but Christ liveth in me; and the life which I now live in the flesh I live by faith of the Son of God, who loved me and gave Himself for me." Galatians 2:20

As we look at the ugly and ungodly happenings in this world, all the dirty sins, vice, crime and corruption; with all the hatred, bitterness; nation against nation, kingdom against kingdom, and even brother against brother; yes, to say nothing of all the sorrow and heartaches that these have brought about, it becomes easy for people to say, well, what is there left to live for in this sinful world? I might say that there is nothing that the devil would like better than to have us think that there is nothing to live for, he wants us to throw up our hands and say what's the use?

Paul lived in troublesome times: though some of our troubles may not be of the same nature as his, because we are living nearer to the end than he was, but nevertheless he had it very hard living in the flesh. Certainly he had it even harder in some respects than we have ever had, for there were men who were constantly after him to destroy him, his life was always in jeopardy, even from the beginning of his ministry to the end. But he was living for something, and had something and somebody to live for. He tells that he is crucified with Christ, "nevertheless I live, vet not I but Christ liveth in me" And he goes on to say, "and the life which I now live in the flesh I live by the faith of the Son of God, who loved me and gave Himself for me." A life lived in the flesh by faith in the Son of God, who gave Himself for us, is certainly worth living. In fact, it is a great joy to live such a life in the flesh, even in this world of trouble and sorrow.

WE ARE SAVED TO LIVE AND SERVE

The Lord doesn't save us just to carry us away to heaven, even though He gives us that blessed hope, and we look forward to that day when we shall be with Him and praise Him forever. Paul himself thought of departing this life to be with Christ, when he said, "For I am in a strait betwixt two, having a desire to depart, and to be with Christ; which is far better:" Philippians 1:23. But still he wanted to serve out his time in the flesh, "Nevertheless to abide in the flesh is more needful for you." Philippians 1:24. So see that this man of God not only desired to live in the flesh by faith in the Son of God, but he wanted to help others by so living. "to abide in the flesh is more needful for you."

It is to some extent understandable that unbelievers, unsaved people, would come to the conclusion that there is nothing to live for, if they persist in the course of sin. I know a Japanese lady who was once considering taking her own life in a time when troubles and sorrows were multiplying for her and her family, when life looked so bleak and without meaning for them. This family had a fair living, plenty to eat, nice clothe wear and a nicely furnished home, ber misfortune began to strike. The husba and father, the bread earner, became m with T.B. and this illness lingered with hime for quite some time, until they had spent all of their living, to the point of selling their household furnishings and the best of their personal clothing. After all, the man died and left his wife with three children to care for, and two of them being afflicted. So this man's wife and mother of his children was left in sorrow and great distress, weeping bitter tears and wondering what to do. One night she went out, according to her own story, walking around in the neighborhood meditating about what to do and considering taking her own life to end it all. But thank the Lord there was a little Baptist Church in the neighborhood, and on this night a group of us were gathered in the church for the mid-week prayer meeting, and a light was shinning from the church where the woman could see it. She came and walked up and down in front of the church a few times and gathered courage to come inside. She was weeping, and we could hear the sobs as she sat and listened to the message of salvation in church that night. After the service some of the Japanese Christians talked to her and witnessed to her personally; and from that time the began to attend all of our services un ____ae was convicted and gloriously saved. This lady is still living today, because she found the Saviour and has something and somebody to live for.

NEVER IN VAIN

The tempter comes and tells us that we are the loosers and might as well give up. But The Lord's promise is much better, so much better! Why listen to the devils lies? The inspired Word of God admonishes us to not surrender to the devil's inducements to give up to our own sorry feelings. One of the great promises in His Word is this, "And let us not be weary in well doing; for in due season we shall reap, if we faint not." Galatians 6:9. Reaping time will surely come, if we don't give up, don't faint. There may be long times of waiting, which will require much patience, agonizing prayer and humbling ourselves before the Lord, before we experience the victory. "weeping may endure for a night, but joy cometh in the morning." Psalm 30:5.

WINNING THE PRIZE

Paul looked forward to final victory and the prize which was waiting for him, and his thoughts seemed to be more on that than the many sorrows and sufferings of the flesh. "But this one thing I do, forgetting those things which are behind, and reaching forth unto those things which are before, I press toward the mark for the prize of the high calling of God in Christ Jesus." Philippians 3:13, 14. The apostle is not talking of salvation here, when he speaks of pressing toward the mark for the prize, because that would be preaching salvation by his own efforts, or salvation by works. He never intended that; for he more than any of the writers wrote of salvation by grace, through faith in Christ. (Ephesians 2:8) He credited his salvation to the precious blood of Jesus Christ, "In whom we have redemption through His blood, the forgiveness of sins, according to the riches of His grace;" Ephesians 1:7; He wasn't serving to escape from the burning, but he had completely surrendered his life to serve, because he loved the Lord and wanted to glorify Him. And he believed that the Lord would give rewards to His servants in that great day

when He shall call them to account. This, of course, for a life lived in the flesh by faith in the Son of God, who loved us and gave Himself for us.

When Paul was nearing the end of his life and the struggle was just about over, and as he was giving to the young preacher Timothy some good instructions, "But watch thou in all things, and endure afflicitions, do the work of an evangelist. make full proof of thy ministry," he then said, "for I am now ready to be offered, and the time of my departure is at hand. I have fought a good fight, I have finished my course, I have kept the faith: Henceforth there is laid up for me a crown of righteousness, which the Lord, the righteous judge, shall give me at that day; and not to me only, but unto all them that love His appearing." I am sure as Paul reflected on the past conflict and the terrible suffering resulting from that fight, that he considered it nothing when compared to the reward, the crown of righteousness, which the Lord had for him and would give him in that day. But he, as others who shall in that day receive a crown, will not feel worthy of it; because we read in Revelation of those who had crowns on their head, and they threw them down at the feet of Him that liveth for ever and ever, saying, "Thou art worthy, O Lord, to receive glory and honor and power; for Thou hast created all things. and for thy pleasure they are and were created." Revelation 4:11.
