Bro. The Bible

"How do we know the Bible came from God? Why couldn't the writers of the Bible have written it?" We often hear this question asked when we witness to an unbeliever. The best answer to it is the Bible itself. Let's look at a good comparison.

Just suppose the leaders of our country decided to build a building that would represent every state in the union. To do this each state would send to Washington D. C. a stone product of their state. Perhaps: Marble from New Hampshire, Granite from Mass., Redstone from Mich,. Sandstone from Ohio, and so on. Each stone is to be completely finished before it leaves the quarry. Finally, all the stones reach the Capital. All different shapes, sizes, and colors. When they are all assembled, they fit perfectly, without being touched by mallet or chisel. They compose a building perfect in every detail, with beauty beyond compare.

Now my question is, how did each stone fit into place when all were cut by different quarrymen? How did each man know what size to cut?

The answer must be: behind them all was a master architect giving the instructions. If someone sent a stone that was not called for, it could be detected, since it would not fit or have a place in the building.

We find this same occurrence is true of the Bible. The books were written hundreds of miles apart, and over a period of some 1500 years. There were many different writers, but still the same master architect over them all. As with the stones, the writings not sent for by the builder are painly seen. Can anyone honestly doubt the builder, and master architect was Almighty God? There's enough proof for me.

(Continued From Page 1) Why was the man Thomas Griffiths persecuted for eleven years by Charles the second? He was a Baptist preacher who preached and practiced that any saved person wishing to lay down membership in the Church of England and become a member of the Baptist Church must be properly baptised by Baptist authority. In order to secure the freedom of exercising business for the Lord, Bro. Griffith and fifteen others sailed from Wales, England

in the year 1701 on board the ship James and Mary, and on the 8th day of September following, they landed at Philadelphia. The fact remains undisputed that true Baptist have never recognized the baptism of any other individual, group or religious sect. Christ established one church kingdom and gave it the authority to keep one baptism and one Lord's supper.

One might ask this question, "Why are these Southern Baptist Convention preachers making such an attack on two who were numbered with them while they lived?" The answer now is the same as it was over a hundred years ago when Bro. Graves was excluded from the First Baptist Church in Nashville, and the answer is - "jealous hearts could not tolerate a native northerner with more knowledge and ability than any man the south could produce.'

The very name "Baptist" was given by God to distinguish God-given authority for the ordinance of baptism. John the Baptist was the first qualified administrator. Jesus walked sixty miles to be baptised at the hands of John. According to the SBC's position of conforming to the world's doctrine, Jesus should not have walked that far just to be baptized by a particular man who had a divine authority. One of Dr. Tull's co-laborers in the previously named publication, Dr. Bob Compton, accused Bro. Pendleton of advocating the universal church concept. In reply, just because Bro. Pendleton misused one word, redeemed rather than baptized, in his "Baptist Church Manual," page five, would hardly qualify him to be an advocate of a certain doctrine after he's been dead for eighty-four years. Gentlemen, that's unsportsmanlike conduct in anyone's league.

It's a known fact that Bro. Graves and Pendleton preached and ably defended the biblical, age-old doctrine of local church identity and authority, while condemning, rejecting, ignoring, refusing, and disregarding any baptism other than that performed by Baptists. So it follows with logic that those attempting to introduce a new theory or doctrine must first destroy the present doctrine and most able doctrine-bearers, namely Bros. Graves and Pendleton. Thus, we witness the SBC forsake for fear, the scriptural ordinance of baptism in order to become a member of the ecumenical movement, therefore, casting aside all identity once and forever as Baptists in favor of the name Christians. Since God named us Baptists and sinners gave us the name Christians, I'll remain until death a grateful wearer of the Baptist name. Just for the record, in the strictest sense of terminology, you must be a Baptist before you can rightfully be called a christian.
