# Letter and Financial Report From Missionary In Israel

C/o Commodore Hotel No. 2 Zamenhoff Street Tel-Aviv, Israel July 5, 1968

Dear Brother Vanderpool and Friends:

I send my greetings to you once again in the name of our Lord Jesus Christ, who loved us, and washed us from our sins in His own blood, Revelation 1:5.

I am glad to report that my health is good, and the blessings of the Lord rest upon me in many, many ways, and in her letters, Annie Laura says that she is well there at home in Nashville. We are living in very perilous times, but this reminds us of a glorious day that is coming soon, the return of our Lord from glory, and while we wait for that great day He gives us His comfort, His peace, and His grace to satisfy all of our needs. He even does more than we ask or think, according to Ephesians 3:20.

People tell me all along that I am up against a difficult task, and some say that it is an impossible one. I realize myself that it is a difficult task, but the best things of life are not achieved easily. The trouble with us is that we too often look for an easy way out; looking back instead of looking forward to the prize of the High calling in Christ Jesus. I believe the Lord said something like the following: 'No man putting his hand to the plow and looking backward is fit for the kingdom of God." In a sense, there is one thing that is easy, that is well worth our taking on. # Why I Am A Baptist

This message is not so much about Why I Became a Baptist, as it is WHY I AM NOW A BAPTIST. Like many others, I was taken as a child to a Baptist Church, and I virtually grew up in a Baptist Church. My parents were Baptists. After I was converted, SAVED, at the age of 13 years, I joined the Church I was used to attending, where I had attended Sunday School and other services all of my life. I was baptized by the Pastor, Dr. D. B. Clapp, who is now in glory. But I was only a lad then.

Now that I am grown and mature, and capable of thinking and weighing evidence, and making decisions for myself on the basis of that evidence, the fact that I was raised a Baptist is not sufficient reason for my remaining a Baptist. I must have reasons, good and sufficient, for remaining a Baptist, and those reasons should not be based upon prejudice, nor sentiment, but upon premises that are valid and certain and incontrovertible, and which will pass scrutiny in the light of Scripture.

WELL, THEN, WHY AM I A BAP-TIST?

(1) I am a Baptist because I want to be a member of a Church that goes by the Whole Bible, - that recognizes the Inspiration and Authority of the Bible. I want NO human creeds, nor dogmas, to direct my thinking.

The Bible is the One Authority in all matters of Faith and Practice. In 2 Timothy 3:16-17 we read that "all scripture is given by inspiration of God

and is profitable for Doctrine, Reproof, for correction, and for instruction in righteousness, that the man of God may be perfect and throughly furnished for every good work" that he is to do. Also Isaiah 8:20 says "to the law and to the testimony; if they speak not according to this word, it is because there is no light in them."

It is always been a proverb with us that "If it is in the Bible its Baptist, and if it is Baptist it is in the Bible." This is my first, and really the all-inclusive reason why I am now a Baptist.

(II) I am a Baptist because I want to be a member of a Church that teaches – A. Salvation by Grace, Through Faith, Without Works. This doctrine is so definitely and clearly taught in Ephesians 2:8-10; Romans 3:28; 4:5; 5:1; Romans 10:1-4, 9, 10, 13-

17. In carefully examining the many different denominations I find that true Missionary Baptists are the only ones who really teach this Bible Doctrine as one of their major tenets.

Many years ago, I made the statement that Missionary Baptists were the only denomination that preaches Salvation By Grace, Through Faith, and Without Works at all. A good friend of mine accosted me later and said that I had over-stepped myself, and said, "We Primitive Baptists preach that." I replied, No, you don't; you preach salvation by grace, and without works, but you omit the "through faith"; you make him saved before faith, in the predestinating purposes of God." He had to admit that I was right.

- B. THE ABSOLUTE NECESSITY OF REGENERATION. Such scriptures as John 3:3-8 show the necessity of the New-birth. Also John 1:11-13; Galations 6:15; and 2 Corinthians 5:17. These all show that a person MUST BE BORN AGAIN, and I believe it for it is in the Bible, and Baptists teach it, and that is another outstanding reason why I am a Baptist.

- C. I want to be a member of a church that teaches THE SECURITY OF THE SAVED. I find this in the Bible in John 10:27-30; 2 Timothy 2:12; Romans 8:35-39; Hebrews 7:25; Jude 24; I Peter 1:3-5, and many other places. I find also that Baptist Churches teach the Doctrine of the Eternal Security of the believer, and so I am a Baptist, and preach this doctrine with all joy. It is one of my most precious beliefs. - D. Baptist Churches teach THE ASSURANCE OF SALVATION; that salvation is a know-so experience. Baptist churches teach along with the Bible that a person can be saved and know it. See I John 3:14; 5:13; 2 Corinthians 5:21; in John 9:25 the man who had been born blind and whose sight Jesus had restored, which is a picture of salvation, said, "One thing I know, whereas I was blind, now I see." This certainly corroborates the teaching that a person can know that they are saved.

I believe in a heart-felt religion. Romans 5:5 says "The love of God is shed abroad in our hearts by the Holy Spirit," and Romans 8:16-17 tells us that "the Spirit bears witness with our spirit that we are the children of God." Baptists teach this kind of religion; it's what I believe the Bible teaches, and so, therefore, I could be nothing else but a Baptist.

- E. I must be a member of a church that preaches JESUS ONLY AS A SAV-IOUR. I find that the Bible teaches that that there is ONE MEDIATOR between God and man, the man Christ Jesus, who gave himself a ransom for all. And in John 14:6, Jesus said that no one could come to the Father but by Himself; and in Acts 4:12 there is no salvation in any other, for there is none other name under heaven, given among men whereby one can be saved. And in careful, and close examination of the doctrine of other church bodies I find that true Baptists are the only ones who consistently stand for the truth.

Now, there may be individual preachers within other denominations who preach these truths, but the Doctrines of those denominations are not built around these truths, and it is for that reason I could not affiliate myself with any other Church body except a Baptist Church.

(III) I am a Baptist because I want to be a member of a church THAT RECOG-NIZES THE LORDSHIP AND HEAD-SHIP OF JESUS CHRIST. Ephesians 1:20-22 tells me that God gave Him to be head over all things to the Church, which is His body. This means that no man, nor set of men as a board, or presbytery, or conference, or religious heirarchy, is to be head over His Church. I want to be in a church that is left free from human entanglements, free to do anything that it honestly and sincerely feels led by the Lord to do; and that can give its Missionary and Benevolent support where it feels that God directs it to give, and not be directed by some board. # Letter and Financial Report From Israel

The Lord has opened up fields for me in recent weeks, and I am very glad and thankful to Him for giving me places to preach while I wait here on my visa. A dear brother, who is an Arab and a Baptist preacher, has invited me to preach to their church in Ramallah and also at their mission in the old walled city of Jerusalem. I have already preached at each of these places once and they want me to preach for them twice a month, once at the mission and once at the church. I have to preach in English, of course, and Brother Abu'Igal, the preacher, interprets my message into Arabic. I really enjoyed preaching to these people, and they treated me with the utmost kindness. There were about thirty people at the mission in Jerusalem on that Tuesday afternoon when I preached there, they were all Arabs, and mostly women. When the service closed the most of them came by to shake my hand; some of them knew a little English, and as they shook my hand, they said, "God bless you." Those words meant just a whole lot to me. I look forward to being with them again this coming Tuesday afternoon. When I go inside the walls of the old city my mind reflects back to the time when our Lord trod along the streets of this city two thousand years ago; and just outside the city walls. there is the place of the Skull, a form of a human face, and there on the little mound He suffered for you and me. It is now a city of confusion, but it is wonderful to know that there are a few true followers of our Lord in this, what was once, the glorious city of Zion.

Ramallah is a city ten miles north of Jerusalem and just two miles west of the ancient Bethel, where Jacob saw the vision of the ladder let down from heaven, and the angels ascending and decending on it, as recorded in Genesis 28. This city was, before the last war between the Jews and Arabs, in Jordan territory, but is now under Israeli occupation. Before the war there could be no passage to and from Ramallah from Israel but now there is free passage, as well as to other points west of the Jordan River.

I have been in Israel five months, or will be by the time you read this, but there is still no answer from my visa application. I went to check on it three days ago, and the lady admitted to me that it does take much longer for them to pass on an application like mine, one requesting a visa to do missionary work. They might keep me waiting all summer, I can't say. But I still look forward to getting it. I continue to request your prayers. I appreciate very much all who have prayed for us and have sent encouraging words to cheer us along the way. We also appreciate and thank you for your offerings. May the Lord bless and reward you very richly.

In the latter part of this month, July, we will be going to Koi Church in Hiroshima to be with the church and their pastor in a revival meeting, God willing. The first of August, Bro. Tajima, Pastor of Koi Church, will come to Ube to assist us in a revival here. Pray for us and for these services; that people will come, open their hearts, and be saved by God's power. Also, this summer, Bro. Tajima and I plan to hold tent meetings in as many different places as possible.

As there is no English-speaking school near us, our sons have had to take their schooling here at home, and Shirley and I have had to teach them. Now David is ready for the 2nd. year of Jr. High. And of course, as Danny started his schooling after we came to Japan, he has never been in an American school with other children. After much earnest prayer to God about this matter, we feel led of the Lord that our sons need to return to the States and enter school there. God called me to Japan, and I came at the time I felt God wanted me to. Also I will stay as long as God directs me through His Spirit, and so I do not feel free to leave now, Shirley will take the children to Kentucky about the middle of August to enroll in the fall term of school, God willing. And then after the children are adjusted she plans to return to Japan to stand by me and assist in this work here. We have always wanted our family to remain together, however, we want to follow God's will completely. We all need your prayers. The boys will be living with my father and mother, and the address will be, Route 4, Glasgow, Ky. 42141.

The Japanese Postal System is now using a zip code. Our code here in Ube is 755, and the postoffice would like for all correspondence to be addressed as I have written the heading of this letter.

We will be praying for all of you and God's work there. Remember us in your prayers.
